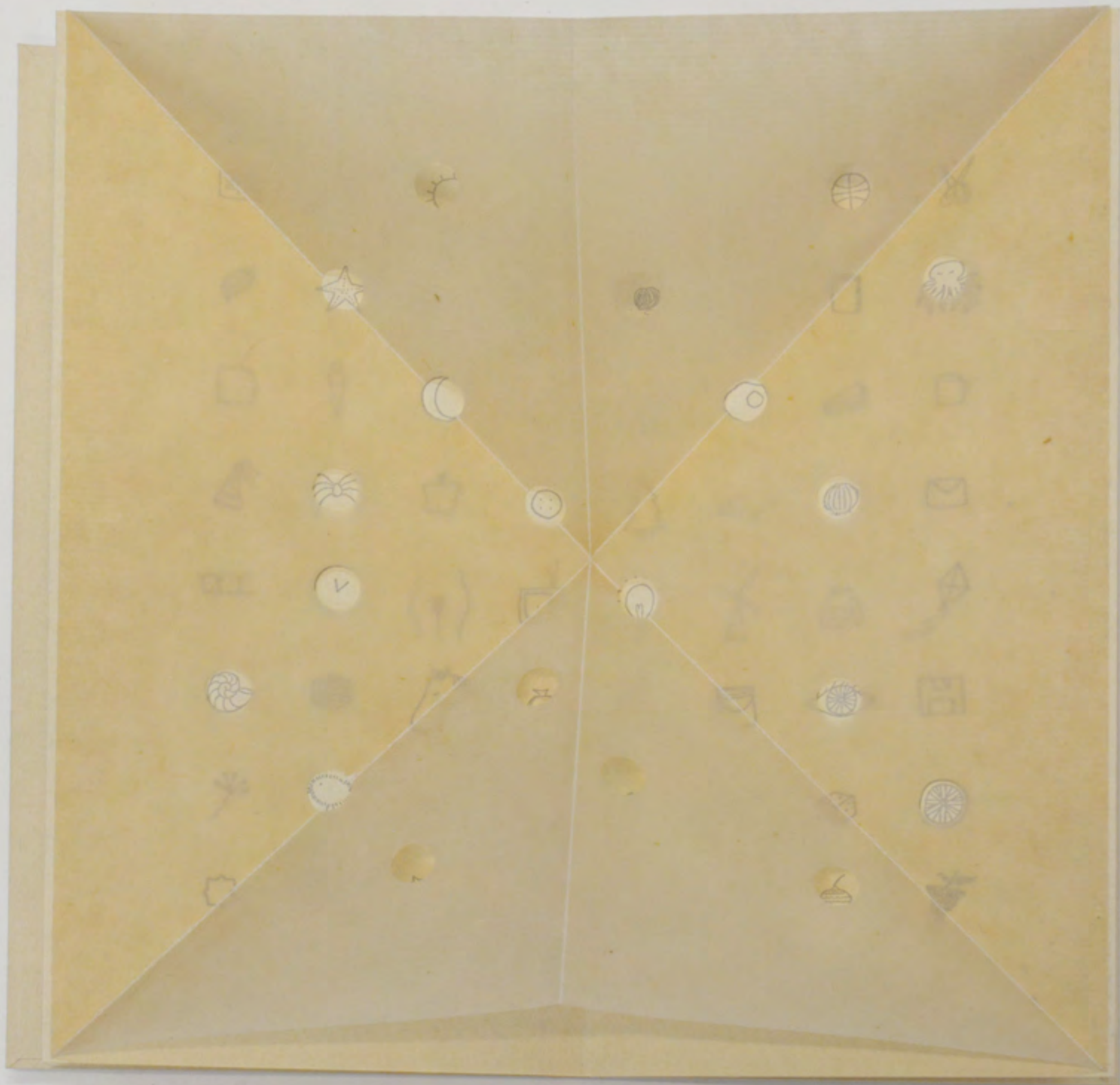


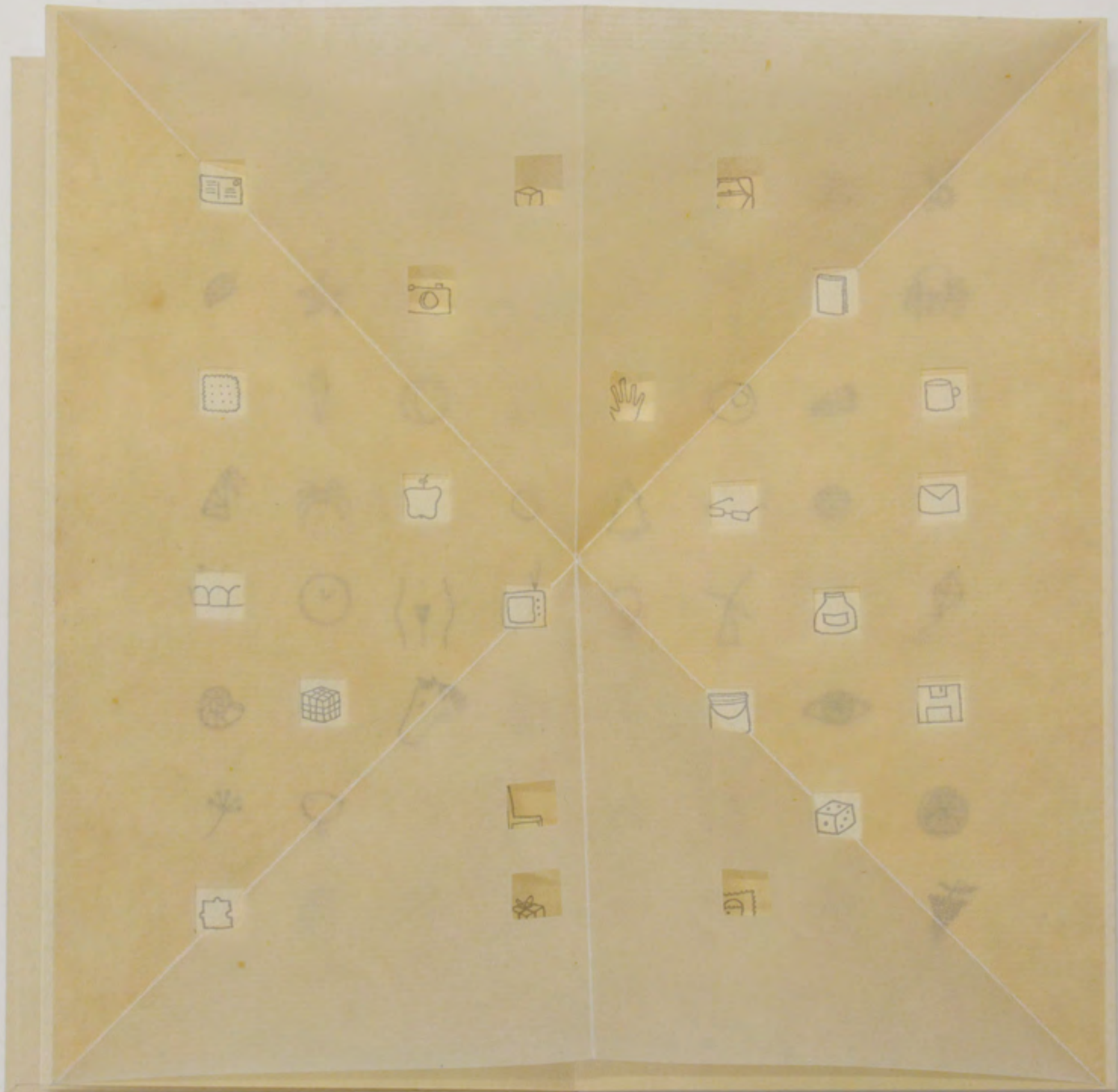
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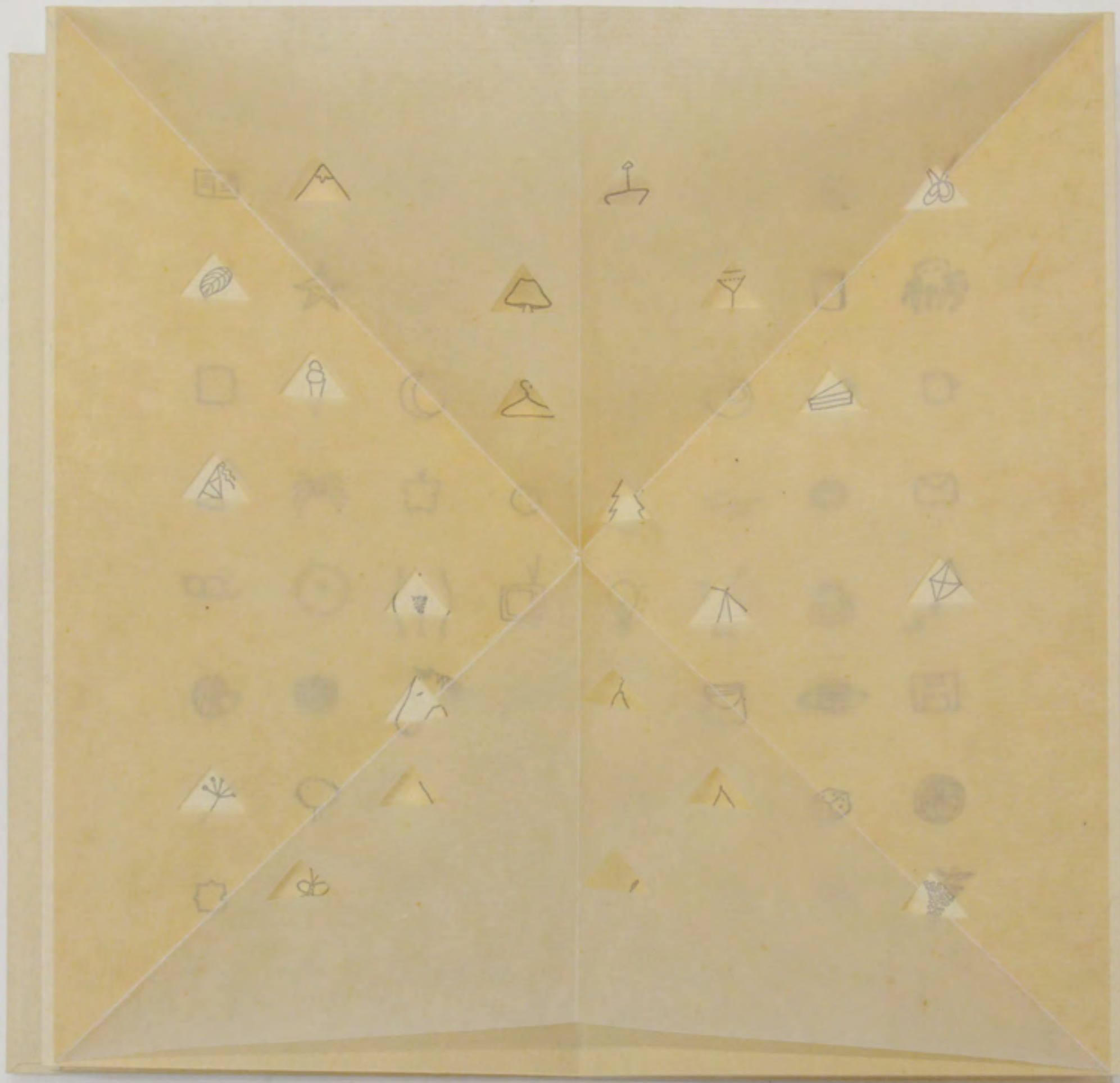












What would our world look like if everything around us from slices of pie to octopodes were identified and categorized according to three simple geometric shapes?
